**Human Caring and Healing – International Certificate Program**

This unique program is the “next generation” of the pioneering education offered at the University of Colorado Denver, College of Nursing’s (UC Denver-CON) Office of Lifelong Learning (previously the Office of Professional Development and Extended Studies) and the original Center for Human Caring. The curriculum for the certificate program will be offered in an intensive and intimate forum (all but one course which has an internet component as well) at scenic, historic Chautauqua Park Retreat Center in Boulder, Colorado. Stay on these beautiful grounds for the duration of the program and study with nationally acclaimed faculty. The Human Caring and Healing - International Certificate Program consists of 6 courses for a total of 8 graduate academic credits. **This is the LAST TIME this program will be offered**; all courses must be successfully completed during this spring enrollment in order to obtain a certificate.

**Courses\***  
**April 29- May 11, 2010<sup>+</sup>**

**Foundations of Healing Practice - Classroom setting - 1 credit - Dr. Janet Quinn - NURS6120-001**

This offering will explore the foundations for health care practice within a caring/healing framework. A fundamental focus of the course is on renewal and inspiration of health care providers as a crucial element in the creation of a true, healing health care system.

**Caring Inquiry: Narrative as Exemplar - Internet and Classroom components required - 2 credits -Instructor to be determined- NURS6121-B01**

This course emphasizes narrative as an interpretive method (1) for understanding the subjective human experiences of health, illness, healing, death/dying; and (2) as a basis for caring/healing practice. Discussion includes narrative theory, selected illness narratives, and implications for praxis.

**Ethics of Caring - Classroom setting - 1 credit - Dr. Francelyn Reeder - NURS6122-001**

This course compares three ethical dimensions of caring: communal, rational, and relational ethics. A postmodern equilibrium among the three is proposed as the essence of caring ethics.

**Health Care as Spiritual Practice - Classroom setting - 1 credit - Dr. Janet Quinn - NURS6124-001**

Based on Nightingale’s philosophy, this experiential course explores the nurse’s work of caring and healing as deep spiritual practice. Spiritual practices from diverse traditions will be explored and experienced with emphasis on integrating learnings into daily professional health care practice.

**Aesthetics and Sacred Traditions of Caring and Healing - Classroom setting - 1 credit - Dr. Jean Watson  
NURS6833-001 (use NURS7833-001 for PhD students only)**

This course will explore Wisdom Traditions of Caring-Healing. Selected ancient worldview intersections will be made between art, science, and diverse world populations, especially indigenous peoples. Aesthetics of sacred rituals, archetypes, symbols and myths of caring-healing practices will be examined.

**Theories & Philosophies of Caring and Healing - Classroom setting - 2 credits - Dr. Jean Watson  
NURS6843-001 (use NURS7843-001 for PhD students only)**

This offering will focus on the diverse philosophies and theories of caring, within the context of Dr. Watson's Theory of Human Caring. The theoretical ideas will be examined for convergence with other contemporary nursing theories, contemporary views of science, the emerging unitary field of integrative health, and relationship-centered caring. The human caring-healing model will be explored as content and context for nursing's emerging paradigm for health sciences education, research, and clinical practice. Special emphasis will be on "theories in action" for transforming clinical care practices through authentic personal-professional practices in the world.

**\*All classes will be held at Chautauqua Park Retreat Center, in the Meadows Room, from 10 a.m. - 4 p.m.**

## Faculty

**Dr. Janet Quinn** is an Associate Professor (Adjunct) at the University of Colorado Denver, College of Nursing. She is an elected Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing and holds a PhD in Nursing Research from New York University. Her research on Therapeutic Touch has been funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, and by the Institute of Noetic Sciences. She serves as a peer reviewer for research grants at the National Institutes of Health, National Center for Complementary and Alternative Medicine. Dr. Quinn is also a personal coach and spiritual director in private practice, with an emphasis on increasing inner awareness and helping people to access the power of the present moment in creating personal and professional lives that work. Dr. Quinn, author of *I Am A Woman Finding My Voice*, lectures and consults internationally on Creating Healing Health Care Systems, Integrative Medicine, Therapeutic Touch, Care for the Caregiver, Healing, Caring, Spirituality and Healing, and Nursing as a Spiritual Practice.

**Dr. Francelyn Reeder**, a leading Rogerian Scholar, is an Associate Professor Emeriti at UC Denver-CON and past associate faculty of the Center for Human Caring. She holds BSN degrees in nursing & minor in ethics from Creighton University and the College of St. Mary Omaha, NE; an MS in Maternal Newborn Nursing & Nurse-Midwifery, from University of Utah; and her PhD in Nursing and Philosophy from NYU Division of Nursing, in tandem with the department of phenomenology at the New School for Social Research, New York City. Her academic career has included faculty positions at Mercy Hospital School of Nursing in Denver, the University of Utah’s College of Nursing Nurse-Midwifery Program Maternal-Child Project on Navajo Reservation; and Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, OH. Her research has addressed touch therapies in the bone marrow transplant unit; and more recently, focused on the power of humor seen in the abilities of student nurses to laugh at themselves, and maintain integrity of self in the midst of social strife and life conflicts. Attention to the problem of global warming and human responsibility is addressed in her latest publication in Nursing Science Quarterly: 2007 "What Shall Count as Evidence in the Year 2050?"

**Dr. Jean Watson** is a Distinguished Professor of Nursing and holds an endowed Chair in Caring Science at the University of Colorado Denver, College of Nursing. She is founder of the original Center for Human Caring in Colorado and is a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing. Dr. Watson has earned undergraduate and graduate degrees in nursing and psychiatric-mental health nursing and holds her Ph.D. in Educational Psychology and Counseling from the University of Colorado, Boulder. Clinical nurses and academic programs throughout the world use her published works on the philosophy and theory of human caring and the art and science of caring in nursing. Dr. Watson’s caring philosophy is used to guide new models of caring and healing practices. She is a widely published author and recipient of several awards and honors, including five (5) Honorary Doctoral Degrees. Her latest books range from empirical measurements of caring, to new postmodern philosophies of caring and healing; these latest works seek to bridge paradigms as well as point toward transformative models for the 21<sup>st</sup> century.
